Celebrations delay due to a 'technicality'

THIS IS VE-DAY. AFTER FIVE YEARS. **EIGHT MONTHS AND FOUR DAYS OF** THE BLOODIEST WAR IN HISTORY BRITAIN AND HER ALLIES HAVE GAINED VICTORY IN EUROPE.

Capitulation of Germany to the Allies was announced by Doenitz yesterday-but a mere technicality in the arrangements made with Russia and America delayed the British people's celebration.

One result of the delay is that Britain's workers get two clear days' holiday-today and tomorrow. This Cabinet decision was disclosed last night.

Originally it was intended that the first day's holiday would not begin until the Prime Minister had spoken.

The announcement late last night that today will be VE-Day was the final act in a be-wildering day following the German surrender.

It is pointed out, however, that their bodies may have been burned and the ashes lost in the wreckage of the burning Ohancellery, or some other of Berlin's destroyed buildings.
